ith more than 8,000 Freemasons across its 250 lodges, Hampshire and Isle of Wight is the largest Province of the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE). It includes the towns of Christchurch and Bournemouth, which moved to the county of Dorset in 1974. Structured in six geographical areas, the Province maintains a real sense of togetherness and friendship between its members while encompassing the wider scope and benefits of a large, leading Province that's at the forefront of many new and exciting initiatives.

In recent years the number of younger members has increased considerably and now thanks to social media they are communicating and spreading their enthusiasm throughout the Province.

Many are passionate about being Freemasons and have been involved in the creation of the Province's ten special interest lodges over the last decade.

Often affectionately called the South Island by local Freemasons, the Isle of Wight is an important part of the Province and its Solent Area. 





HOW THE PROVINCE'S MEMBERS HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED VIA THE MASONIC CHARITABLE

FOUNDATION

During the year*, members and their families and dependents benefited from 257 grants totalling £766,623 - all delivered through the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF).

A breakdown of the awards is as follows:

- Just over £444,000 was given to those in financial difficulty, in many cases as a direct result of loss of income due to Covid and the lockdowns.
- Around £276,000 was distributed to support health-related issues, such as surgical

procedures, mobility aids, stairlifts, domiciliary care, assessments, and consultancy costs. It also included seven referrals to the MCF's Counselling Care Line service.

• And £46,000 was used to help with education, including fees, equipment and clothing.

In order to achieve this high level of support, the Advice and Support Team undertook 150 visits to applicants, whist 60 were completed by the Province's Visiting Volunteers during the period.

THE HAMPSHIRE AND ISLE OF WIGHT MASONIC CHARITABLE TRUST SUPPORTING BRETHREN AND THEIR FAMILIES

he Hampshire and IOW Masonic Charitable Trust (MCT) is the Province's own charity and is funded by investments and supported by donations from lodges.

It continues to provide a prompt response to requests for financial assistance from lodge members and their families. During the past 12 months there have been 22 grants made by the Trust totalling £22,250, with a further £16,646 approved and waiting to be awarded in case of need.

Due to the Covid pandemic there has been a growing number of requests for assistance, and additional funds were allocated to help alleviate some of the financial pressures brought about by the effects of this disease.

The reasons for support are very varied and in a recent case, for example, the widow of a member

suffered a brain tumour. The tumour is stable but she is unable to work and with little income the financial pressure has been relieved by a grant to cover daily living costs. Another case involved the MCT providing the finances for a grandson of a member to receive a 'specialist' dog to help alleviate the problems he experiences with severe autism.

Noel Voice, the chairman of the Trustees, said that there are increasing numbers of brethren who are experiencing financial and health difficulties. The Trust is proud to be able - and ready - to provide immediate responses to all applications that warrant its support.

The Provincial MCT works closely with the Masonic Charitable Foundation at Grand Lodge and many cases considered locally are referred to London for further ongoing support.

THE HAMPSHIRE AND ISLE OF WIGHT MASONIC GRAND CHARITY

he Hampshire and Isle of Wight Masonic Grand Charity was founded in 1985 by the then Provincial Grand Master, the Right Worshipful Brother, Col. Thomas Bennett Langton. It is usually known as The Tom Langton Fund and since its inception has approved grants of almost £850,000 to small charities and worthy causes throughout the Province.

Its aim from the beginning was to create contacts between lodges and the general public by supporting non-Masonic causes. The ideal beneficiaries are small self-help groups with limited resources, especially those whose activities involve children and less able-bodied people, where a grant would make a significant difference to their work and success.

Referrals come from lodge charity stewards to one of 12 charity representatives in the Province who investigate and report to the approval committee. The committee has met twice during the past year, and approved donations to 24 non-Masonic

charities, totalling £14,460.

The grants awarded varied in size from £250 to £1,000 and these were made to support a wide range of projects and causes. As at 31st December 2021 the Fund's value of investments totalled £953,690, which had fallen to £937,339 by 31st March 2022 due to unrest in the markets.

Under the chairmanship of Ron Griffiths, and despite the restrictions imposed by the pandemic, the Fund has had another successful year with many lodges making applications.

Ron said: "Despite the drop in our investment income we have never turned away a valid request from a lodge wanting to support a needy cause."

Often, money raised by lodges will be 'matched' by the Fund, and examples of those who have benefitted this year include Portsmouth Down Syndrome Society, two Scout troops, a marching band, community library, search and rescue dogs and a sailing association that helps disadvantaged children.



FOCUS ON THE LONELY

harity was brought into sharp focus throughout the pandemic as Covid caused widespread difficulties for people, especially the elderly. With many older people forced to isolate and protect themselves from the virus, it inevitably led to loneliness.

While younger people were able to easily adapt to technology in order to stay in touch with family and friends, some senior citizens did not have that capability. A grant from the Province delivered through the Masonic Charitable Foundation to Age Concern Hampshire enabled more than 800 older people to re-join their communities as the pandemic faded.

The £25,000 went to the charity's Information and Wellbeing project, which gives telephone support, hosts weekly social activities and supports volunteering opportunities. It meant those on their own could access Community Information Volunteers who are based in rural areas and remote villages and provide information about local support services, social groups and trustworthy tradespeople.

The number of older residents in Hampshire is high compared with the national average, with more than 20 per cent aged over 65.

Brogan Rehill, Head of Fundraising and Marketing at Age Concern Hampshire, said: "We're very grateful to Hampshire and Isle of Freemasons for their generous grant. It will help hundreds of local older people who have experienced very high levels of depression, anxiety and loneliness since they were forced to self-isolate in the pandemic. Our aim is to help them fully re-join the community."

SUPPORTING OUR VETERANS

rom the earliest days the Province has been closely linked with the military and there are many veterans across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. One charity that cares for forces' veterans and has two of its specialist homes in Gosport was given a £20,000 grant for funding support staff.

Alabaré was founded in 1991 by Rev John Proctor and his wife Alicia after they befriended and offered a home to a series of people in crisis. They soon realised that the need was far greater than they alone could meet and in partnership with a Christian community founded the charity that helps hundreds of veterans.

One of those who benefited from the charity was Royal Navy veteran Tim Battersby who saw service in three theatres of war and after losing his wife to Covid subsequently lost his home. Living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and having suffered from septicaemia, Tim was referred to Alabaré. Staff helped him put his life back together and guided him through the difficulties and bureaucracy that left him homeless.

Jon Whitaker visited one of the homes with John Pearson, the Province's Charity Steward. They met Tim and other veterans.

Jon said: "It's absolutely a vocation. I found it very easy to chat to the veterans. They are so honest."

BRINGING LOVED ONES CLOSER TOGETHER

he Province's funding has also helped bring people together – literally – by paying for one of the

'cuddle beds' at Winchester's new hospice. It allows loved ones to spend precious moments closer together in comfort. The money also helped fund an art therapist.

Burrell House, in the grounds of the Royal Hampshire County Hospital, was converted into Winchester Hospice and opened in September following the success of a £4.4m community-backed fundraising campaign. The hospice has ten cuddle beds which make a big difference to patients and their relatives – with the press of a button the beds open up, making room for two.

Freemasons in the Winchester area raised and donated £18,000 and this was topped up with £2,000 from the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Nick Vaughan, chair of Winchester Hospice Fundraising Charity, said: "As we continue the

> charity's fundraising campaign to ensure the delivery of enhanced care and support for patients and their loved ones, the additional funds we received from the Freemasons are much appreciated.

> "This financial support will also enable the hospice team to employ the specialist skills of an art therapist who will provide a valuable form of psychotherapy support."

Jon Whitaker said: "I'm delighted that Freemasons across the Province have been able to support this new hospice that will do so much to comfort people in great distress."

Winchester Hospice is run by Hampshire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, which has hospitals in Winchester, Basingstoke and Andover.

HELPING CHILDREN BEAR UP

hildren can find hospital visits and emergency situations stressful and frightening, which was why Teddies for Loving Care (TLC) was launched.
Freemasons in Essex set up the scheme in 2001 and it provides cuddly toys to hospitals, air ambulances, injury units and other places where scared youngsters might find themselves.

The bears comfort the children who often form strong bonds with their new furry friends – and they always get to keep them. Since its inception 21 years ago, the scheme has donated more than 3.5 million bears across England and Wales.

Freemasons fund and administer the scheme and within Hampshire and Isle of Wight 14 hospitals, A&E and minor injury units have been supplied. Medical staff say the teddies help children calm down after traumatic accidents, and doctors and nurses can use the bears to help describe to children the treatments they are to receive.

Jackie Lewis, paediatric staff nurse at Petersfield Urgent Treatment Centre, said: "Having these bears is so helpful. The children love them and they help massively in terms of building rapport with those who are afraid of the situation. Thank you so very much."

When Richard Power of Lentune Lodge in Lymington read an article in his local paper he realised that TLC could help. Rather than supply a hospital he took 72 teddy bears to Lymington Police Station where they will be used when young children are involved in their work.

Sgt Andy Gwyer said: "We are extremely grateful for the kind donation of these bears. They will be put to good use and will be given to children who are involved in incidents, including domestic abuse."

Another member of Lentune Lodge, Richard Powers, is going to walk 70 miles non-stop around the Isle of Wight to raise money for TLC.



HELPING THE LIFE-LIMITED LIVE WELL FOR LONGER

grant of £25,000 from the Province to Rowans Hospice in Purbrook near Portsmouth is helping its patients to

live well for longer. Delivered through the

Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) to the charity's Living Well Centre, the money has been directed towards technology.

The latest tech and software means patients can benefit from Rowans' services without leaving home. They can borrow equipment and receive IT support, which gives them the ability to join online group sessions or have

one-to-one meetings with staff. Rowans provides virtual therapeutic relaxation and reminiscence programmes, which are hugely beneficial not just for the patient but for their families.

Hospice CEO Ruth White said: "We are very grateful to the Freemasons for their generous grant which will assist our patients to live well longer. When someone can remain at home in familiar surroundings, there is a better chance of a more peaceful death."

Rowans' Living Well Centre opened in 2018 and is in daily touch with over 1,000 adults through its Living Well Centre and some 500 others including carers and the bereaved.

An example of the importance of technology was brought home during the Covid pandemic. One

man suffering with Motor Neurone Disease and communication problems was able to connect with the Living Well Centre using the computer programme Teams. He was newly diagnosed and the link enabled him to see the nurse supporting

> him – not just hearing her. Eye contact is important.

Through weekly support he was able to discuss his future, receive emotional support and was able to be referred to other professionals. His partner was also present at the time of his video calls, allowing the charity to support her as his main carer. She described Rowans' Living Well Centre as a 'lifeline'.

The charity's 'reminiscence digital virtual group' is another example of the work it does. The group allows those with dementia or cognitive impairment to share their life experiences and stories from the past with others.

Liz, who is a carer for her husband, said: "Norman looks forward to the group each week. It provides him with a focus, routine and is purely for him."

She also feels she benefits when attends, knowing he is happy enjoying talking to others not just her.

John Pearson, the Province's Charity Steward, said: "We are very pleased we've been able to assist Rowans Hospice. We have supported the Hospice since it was established in 1994. They do an outstanding job of helping people with terminal or life limiting conditions, as well as supporting their families through difficult times."

A TOUCHING DONATION

£30,000 grant from the Province to the Living Paintings charity is enabling hundreds of blind and partially-sighted children to enjoy the world of pictures, books and learning. The charity produces 'Touch to See' books that combine tactile pictures and audio descriptions.

Over the next two years the charity hopes to use the money to expand its service so it reaches 1,900 children - and it plans to introduce 30 more titles. The books enable the blind and partially-sighted to develop literacy and communication skills and to engage more in the classroom. They are sent by a free postal service to those who need them.

Peter Vosser, Assistant Provincial Grand Master, visited the home of a young user and his family. Monty, five, demonstrated how the books work

John Pearson, Provincial Charity Steward, said: "I'm very pleased we've been able to help Living Paintings with their hugely important project. It's

hard to think of a more essential skill than being able to read. Literacy is the key to education, future employment and the pleasure that comes from books lasts a lifetime.

"However, for blind and partially-sighted children learning to read is much more difficult than for those who are sighted. Living Paintings are giving a gift that will last a lifetime."

Camilla Oldland, Chief Executive Officer at Living Paintings, said: "We're so grateful to Hampshire and Isle of Wight Freemasons for this wonderful grant. Thanks to Living Paintings, blind and partially-sighted children are learning to love and read books — a lifelong gift — and are engaging with classroom education alongside their sighted friends.

"Our charity can only provide these completely free, constantly expanding and developing services thanks to donations such as this. Since the onset of Covid our work has never been more needed, which makes this grant even more valuable and impactful."

UPLIFTING DONATIONS

reemasons have been funding air ambulances since they were first introduced. The Province's brethren have supported the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance, and those in the south-west area have raised money for the Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance.

Leading the fundraising charge for the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance has been the Widows' Sons Masonic Bikers Association, Southern Chapter.

Mike Haywood, President of the leather-clad bikers, and Jon Whitaker, visited the operations base at Thruxton airfield to donate a cheque for £13,000. They were joined by Mike Wilks, the previous Provincial Grand Master, who is a noted biker and honorary member of the Widows' Sons.

During the visit the charity's chief executive officer Richard Corbett said: "It was great to meet some of the Freemasons and Widows' Sons who have championed the work of our charity for so many years. Our specialist paramedics and doctors may be on the front line, but they are only able to save lives thanks to the amazing support we receive."

The bikers raised the money by embarking on a 'big bike ride' in which the chapter motored nearly 2,000 miles from Portsmouth to John O'Groats and back.

A further £7,000 was raised over the year for the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance by 15 lodges across the Province, leading to £20,000 in donations. The 'big bike ride', which has become an annual event, hopes this year to raise £20,000 by itself.

Since entering service in 2007 the the air ambulance has received tens of thousands of pounds from the Province's members and their lodges.

Coombs and Colin Ratley, launched the
South East Area Festive Board to help their
fellow members stay in touch during lockdowns.

It also raised money for charities through raffles, making up for funds that would usually be raised at meetings.

Graham's wife Sue is a member of The Lodge of Duty in the Order of Woman Freemasons and their members were heavily involved from the start. Through Covid, the initiative raised more than £26,000 which was donated to dozens of local charities.

As the pandemic came to an end and lodge meetings

resumed, Graham Lant and his team were looking at ways of how they might continue with the initiative.

An opportunity came to work with the Portsmouth News following conversations with the editor, Mark Waldron.

Now named the 'Community Chest', the initiative continued to raise money throughout 2022 and News readers sent in nominations of who should receive the donations. A panel including local dignitaries as well as leading Freemasons made the final decisions.

The News' editor Mark Waldron said: "The partnership started from a conversation with the Freemasons about them helping good causes and charities. Not many people know about the work they do and I thought it was about time we started sharing the information. From there, a partnership

with The News was born to use our power to spread the word and let everyone know what is going on.

MASONIC MILESTONES RECOGNISED

fter joining The Craft, many Freemasons remain members for the rest of their lives, and they receive certificates when hitting various milestones.

It is a rare occasion when a 70-year certificate is presented but Provincial Grand Master Jon Whitaker was able to do exactly that when his friend Henry McWhinnie completed his seventh decade as a Freemason. Henry joined Montgomerie Kilwinning Lodge in Ayrshire, Scotland, as a 20-year-old.

Jon Whitaker visited his Hampshire and Isle of Wight lodge, Palma Virtuti Lodge in Aldershot. He presented him with a certificate and lapel pin as well as a copy of his original registration form. He then gave him a field promotion to Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden. Henry also received a lapel pin and letter of congratulations from his mother lodge in Scotland.

The year saw a number of 50-year certificates presented, with two on one night at Royal Marine Portsmouth Lodge in April. Assistant Provincial Grand Master Barrie Hewitt presented David Colbourne and Terry Chapman with their half-century certificates. It was also the lodge's 75th anniversary meeting.

Octa Lodge in Bournemouth saw its member Rodney Dale receive his 50-year certificate, which was presented by South West Area chairman Chris Lockwood – now Assistant Provincial Grand Master. Also in Bournemouth, Ian Young of Bourne Lodge received his 50 year certificate from Chris Lockwood.

Tony Digweed received his 50-year certificate at Twelve Brothers Lodge at the King's Court centre in Chandler's Ford. Presenting it, Jon Whitaker recalled how as a 'rookie Grand Officer', Tony - then Provincial Grand Secretary - had given him friendly and invaluable guidance.

Another half-centurion was Malcolm Childs of Landport Lodge in Portsmouth who received his certificate from Barrie Hewitt.

Gerry Underwood of Friendship and Justice Lodge in Southampton received a unique 'certificate of service' for his charitable activities and fundraising. The meeting was attended by the heads of three orders; Craft, Royal Arch and Mark.

Other recipients included Past Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies Allan Gregory, Inspector General in the Rose Croix order, who received a certificate for 50 years' service and the PGM's Certificate of Meritorious Service. Likewise, John Prizeman, Deputy Grand Master in the Mark degree, received a 50 year certificate for his service as well as the Certificate of Meritorious Service, both presented when the PGM visited his lodge at Hursley.









FREEMASONS ON TOUR

An initiative that started in the South West Area has now travelled across the Province and become fully established. It was decided to form a group of Freemasons who would visit a lodge *en masse* – and this became the South West Area Tourists.

Formed in October 2017, the tourists were immediately popular and the idea was followed quickly in all the other areas in the Province. A lodge meeting is selected, sometimes because it has an important or significant event, and an invitation is issued to the 'tourists'. The mass visiting adds to numbers, creates friendships, enhances camaraderie and allows members to

experience lodges other than their own. Following the lockdowns the tourists' visits have resumed and remain hugely popular.

In the South East Area the Band of Brothers group was formed and it has now created a '100 club' with the intention that twice a year it takes 100 Freemasons to a lodge meeting.

While individual visiting is the lifeblood of Freemasonry and many lodges have reciprocal visits with each other, the 'tourists' takes this a step further.

SHOOTING FOR CHARITIES

Among the wide-ranging hobbies enjoyed by members is clay pigeon shooting, and regular matches are held against the neighbouring province of Dorset. One supporter of these events was the late Leon Whitfield, and in his memory a match was held in May between the counties at the Purbeck Shooting School.

More than 50 members attended and it was Hampshire and Isle of Wight that claimed the trophy after an extremely tight contest. A total of £4,000 was raised which was used to buy a

defibrillator for the shooting school, with the rest going to the Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance, Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance and £400 for CJD Family Support.

FRONTLINE WORKERS DAY

he Province swung full-square behind the Frontline Workers' Day last July and acknowledged the efforts and sacrifices of those battling Covid at the coalface. Freemasonry was one of the core supporters of the event alongside English Heritage, Women's Institute and the Cadet Forces.

Lodge centres and individual members at their homes flew especially-designed flags, banners and bunting. It gave an opportunity for centres to raise their profiles with the public and demonstrated their support for all those who had worked so hard during the battle against Covid.

On the same day, the Brockenhurst centre held a plant and cake sale. The good weather and the banners attracted many passers-by and £280 was raised for Lymington Hospital. At the Woolston

centre members laid on a burger van and drinks which were completely free for members of the public, many of whom had a tour of the building and some have now become Freemasons.

Across England and Wales The United Grand Lodge of England was joined in the event by the two grand lodges of women Freemasons - Freemasonry for Women and the Order of Women Freemasons.

Bruno Peek, pageant master to the Queen and creator of NHS, Social Care and Frontline Workers' Day, said: "We are delighted that Freemasons, whose members come from all walks of life, played such a high profile and active role. Those within the NHS, social care and on the frontline undertake so much for us all, 24 hours a day, seven days a week and 52 weeks a year, without any thought of their own safety."



FROM THE PROVINCIAL GRAND SECRETARY

A FRANK RECOLLECTION OF TAKING THE PROVINCE FROM QUILL TO COMPUTER

first appeared in the Provincial Office in April 2013 to meet Colin Upton, the Provincial Secretary at that time who sat behind a very large desk looking important and powerful. Colin couldn't have been more helpful teaching me the ropes and it was good to see him moving on to greater things as Deputy Grand Superintendent in the Royal Arch once I had taken over the reins.

At the beginning, I was appointed 'Deputy to the Provincial Grand Secretary' – this was for two reasons; firstly, I was already Provincial Senior Grand Warden and secondly Geoff Brooks, being a Grand Officer, had been appointed Provincial Secretary, albeit in an honorary position. Geoff represented the Province by attending the AGMs of other provinces whilst I did the secretary's job; managing the office and the administrative functions. This was a very peculiar setup and not without its difficulties. Two years later I took on the full role of Provincial Grand Secretary.

My initial objectives were to make the Provincial Office more approachable and replace the paper processes with computer-based systems ... so the first thing to go was the big desk, which was replaced by a round meeting table and a fruit bowl. I also had a long chat with Mary, my assistant at the time, to check that she was fully on board with the proposed changes. Mary was very supportive in the years that followed.

The second objective was more difficult as the office processes had been developed over time and many were set in stone. In those days it was not unusual for the office staff to congregate in

the boardroom and spend an hour or so stuffing envelopes. Communication to lodge secretaries was mostly by post and many secretaries didn't even have an email address.

Adelphi, The United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) database, was the obvious route forward and I gained agreement from the office staff that we would clean up the data and concentrate all our efforts in developing one shared, useable database. This was no mean feat and we spent a year contacting every lodge in the Province, checking and double checking the data, filling in the gaps, looking up past ranks and confirming honorary members. We also began entering Provincial Installation data at the Provincial Office for all lodge officers, so that we now have historical records from 2014 for Directors of Ceremony, Deacons, Stewards and all other offices who were not previously recorded. It's good to see that this principle will be further developed next year with the introduction of Project Hermes which will enable lodge secretaries to have full control of their membership data and make corrections directly into Adelphi.

During this period, we were joined in the office by David Barron, a larger-than-life character who eventually became my deputy. Fridays were always days of fun with lunch in the café at Asda with David, Nigel Bell and myself getting into all sorts of mischief. I received a phone call whilst on holiday in May 2019 with the sad news that David had suddenly passed away.

Amongst my previous jobs I had spent some time in the Whitbread marketing department and suggested to the Provincial Grand Master, Mike Wilks, that a Marketing Committee would be a good idea. I identified all the professional marketeers in the Province; Roger Maber, Greg Williams and Rod Armitage to name a few. Out of this came the Province's first structured recruitment campaign based on the strapline 'why I became a Freemason,' which was supported by posters and pop-up displays that are still in use today. The Marketing

Committee also first introduced the concept of using social media for recruitment and installed standardised poster frames for advertising and recruitment in masonic centres.

I am proud to have been involved in many of the other initiatives that have now become well established in the Province. These include the annual honours process, setting up the Area structure, analysis of member statistics, the Pathway process (which was launched in this Province well before the UGLE version), the Five Year Plan, the Welcome to

Freemasonry and Master Masons Guides and the secretaries' admin facility on the Provincial website, to name but a few.

Sailing is one of my main hobbies and 2016 saw the consecration of Spinnaker Lodge No. 9932 for which I had the honour of being Primus Master. The objectives of the lodge were to attract those brethren interested in yachting and motorboating

LODGE ANNIVERSARIES

istory is important in Freemasonry in so many ways; from the stories of King Solomon's Temple to the recent past and how the Craft adapted to Covid. A meeting that

celebrates a lodge's 'significant birthday' is an important one, and one that brings great pride to members.

Within the last year the Royal Gloucester Lodge that meets in Southampton marked its 250th anniversary. It gained its warrant in 1772 when George III was on the throne and Lord North was Prime Minister.

Other lodges celebrating included the Lodge of Hengist that meets in Bournemouth – it was due to celebrate its 250th anniversary in 2020 but Covid prevented it. The

lodge originally met in Christchurch – before Bournemouth even existed – but later moved to the growing resort town that until 1974 was in Hampshire.

The brethren of The Lodge of Harmony in Fareham have been meeting harmoniously for 225 years.

Founded in 1796 – the year when Freemason Robert Burns' poem Auld Lang Syne was published - they now meet in the aptly-named Harmony Hall.

Zetland Lodge in Aldershot celebrated 175 years and Saint Hubert Lodge in Andover and Aldershot Camp Lodge both celebrated 150 years.

Southsea Lodge celebrated its centenary and all who went received a copy of a summons for the first meeting. After that first meeting its brethren enjoyed a seven course meal.

REMEMBERING THE HOLOCAUST

olocaust Memorial Day was marked on January 27 – 77 years after the liberation of Auschwitz. Freemasons across the Province – including many Jewish members – attended services and wreath-laying ceremonies.

In Havant, Assistant Provincial Grand Master Barrie Hewitt was amongst those who addressed a large gathering. The others who gave addresses and readings were the local mayor, Holocaust survivors and local schoolchildren.

He laid one of the many wreaths as those looking on remembered the six million Jews murdered by the Nazi machine, and others killed in genocides. The theme of Barrie's address was 'One Day' and the hope that one day there will be no more terrible acts of genocide.

He concluded with the words of Anne Frank, who wrote: "It's really a wonder that I haven't dropped all my ideals because they seem so absurd and impossible to carry out. Yet I keep them because in spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart."

ROYAL OCCASION AT WINCHESTER LODGE

he Lodge of Economy in Winchester was privileged to receive the first Prestonian lecture of 2022 when Dr John Hawkins delivered it in February. This lecture is the only one given under the authority of the United Grand Lodge of

England and it runs for just one year.

The subject of the lecture this Jubilee year was, fittingly, The Royal Family and Freemasonry. It is to be delivered just three times so those who packed the lodge room in Winchester to hear it were privileged indeed.

Dr Hawkins presented Jon Whitaker with a copy of his book which has the same title as the lecture. During the last 209 years since the two grand lodges came together to form the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE), a member of the Royal Family has been Grand Master for more than 150 of them.

Dr Hawkins was permitted to delve into UGLE and Royal archives to research his lecture and book. Some Royal Freemasons are well-known and others less so – but they all provide fascinating stories that help make up the rich tapestry of Freemasonry.

William Preston (1742-1818), regarded as the foremost Masonic educator of his time, left a legacy to provide for an annual lectureship. The selection procedure for lecturers was altered in 2018 and now the Provincial Grand Masters, Metropolitan Grand Master and the secretary of Quatuor Coronati Lodge submit names of those with possible lecturers.

Each hopeful puts forward a synopsis and the winner is then selected.

MENTAL HEALTH SEMINAR

ne side-effect of the Covid pandemic was the impact it had on people's mental health. The Province's Almoners Team became aware of developing issues, and referrals to the Masonic Charitable Foundation's (MCF) counselling line increased.

To bring the issue into the open, raise awareness

and hear what steps could be taken to alleviate the problem and prevent it, a seminar was organised by Provincial Grand Almoner Neil Morse. It was aimed at lodge almoners but with an open invitation to members and around 150 from across the Province attended the event held at Eastleigh Football Club in March.

Fortuitously, the organisers were able to call on Hampshire and Isle of Wight Freemason David


Walbridge, a retired consultant psychiatrist, who spoke on 'causes and effects' of mental health,

following an introduction by Jon Whitaker.

Speaking on 'coping mechanisms' was Phil Matthews, who was suggested by Mental Health First Aid England. He is also a Freemason, from Gloucestershire.

Malcolm Collier, the Provincial Grand Almoner designate, spoke about 'Ways forward in the

Province' and what can be done within Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. Kath Betts, the local Advice and Support Officer from the MCF, also attended and was able to explain what advice and support was available from the charity. Hampshire County Council, SSAFA – the armed forces' charity – and ManGang, the Southampton-based mental health charity, all provided assets and information.







A+ FOR UNIVERSITY SCHEME

t was more than 200 years ago when Apollo Lodge in Oxford was consecrated, and other 'university' lodges soon followed. In 2005 the United Grand Lodge of England launched the University Scheme to connect existing lodges with universities, and create new lodges.

There are now more than 90 lodges under this scheme, with 11 joining in the last two years along with two newly consecrated scheme lodges. In the Province of Hampshire and Isle of Wight there are three university lodges: William of Wykeham Lodge (Winchester), Domus Dei

Lodge (Portsmouth), and Southampton University Lodge.

The lodges forge close relationships with the universities, often attend freshers' fairs, and provide a way into Freemasonry – with half fees for those under 25. Members of Southampton University Lodge had a stand at the October Freshers' Fair -

and have been given an open invitation to do this every year.

They were joined by the Order of Women Freemasons. The stand generated much interest amongst the students, most not realising women were also included. Gone are the days of the old mantra, 'it's just a blokes drinking club'.

All three of the Province's university lodges weathered the Covid storm well and each took part in the 'DKW Cup Challenge'. A replica of the cup, named after David Kenneth Williamson, Founder President of the Universities Scheme, is passed between university lodges by members - on foot.

Domus Dei Lodge took the cup from West Sussex, handed it over to William of Wykeham Lodge

whose members took it to Southampton. That city's mayor Alex Houghton – a member of Southampton University Lodge - welcomed the cup and sent it on its way to London Haven Lodge in Dorset.

In September last year it finally made its way to Grand Lodge in Great Queen's Street,

London. The #Challenge2021 walk raised £16,000 for the Duke of Edinburgh Memorial Fund.

Jon Whitaker invited his predecessor Mike to take the Chair as Consecrating Officer, enabling him to complete his aim of consecrating 10 new lodges across the Province. Primus Master of the new lodge Bill Withers presented Mike with a surprise memento — an embroidered banner displaying the logos of all those new specialist lodges that continue to prosper.

Mike said: "It is a great memento of a great day, reflecting on 10 wonderful years. I'm so grateful to the Provincial Grand Master for the privilege of being able to consecrate the new lodge."

The special interest lodges are those dedicated to Scouting, boating, motorsports, football, rugby,

aviation, motorcycling, armed forces and 'blue light' services, and one called 'Brevity' – for busy people who don't have much time.

These lodges allow members to combine their Freemasonry with hobbies and passions amongst like-minded people. Strong friendships are created because those attending have dual interests — and this adds to camaraderie during meetings. Each works the same way as other lodges but enables



members to enjoy the company of those with the same interests.

A SIGN OF RESPECT – THE ARMED FORCES COVENANT

t was in Winchester's
Great Hall that contains
the 13th century Arthurian
Round Table where Jon
Whitaker signed the Armed
Forces Covenant along with
Leo Docherty, Parliamentary
Under-Secretary of State for
Defence People and Veterans.

The Province has always had a close association with the armed forces and includes 17 military lodges and many members who serve or are veterans. The Covenant represents the Province's continued commitment to ensure that no member of the armed forces' community will face disadvantage within the

organisation. Furthermore, it is a pledge to provide grants and support to serving personnel, veterans and their families through funding from lodges.

Hampshire Freemason, Lt Col Bill Withers (rtd), addressed those present and gave a brief history of Freemasonry and its relationship with the military.

Also attending the ceremony was Hampshire's Vice Lord-Lieutenant, Rear Admiral Iain Henderson, CB, CBE, DL, who said: "The signing of the Armed Services Covenant cements the strong relationship that Freemasonry has with the military, veterans and their families. I welcome this continued commitment and am delighted to witness the signing."

Many serving personnel, veterans and Freemasons were present. Also there were members of

the county council, which recognised National Armed Forces Day by a flag raising ceremony that preceded the signing. LAUNCHING THE 2027 FESTIVAL

lanning for the launch of the Province's 2027 Festival in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) began in the summer of 2020 and as would be expected, given the pandemic, this took far longer than we would have liked.

Notwithstanding, a great team was assembled consisting of six Area Festival Chairmen, two Festival Ambassadors, a Festival Secretary, a Festival Support Executive and myself. The Festival team has been greatly assisted by both the Provincial Grand Charity Steward and the Provincial Communications Officer.

Many hours were spent on Zoom meetings discussing a range of topics. These included strategy, Festival promotion, Festival launch brochure, the role of the Ambassadors, and honorific levels. On several of our meetings we were joined by the Provincial Grand Master (PGM) and Deputy PGM. Our meetings culminated in a Zoom call with the MCF in March 2021 during which many aspects of the Festival and the launch were discussed.

Due to the uncertainty of the pandemic at that time we were unable to settle on a date for the launch. We were keen to include it at our AGM, but there were still major uncertainties surrounding its date.

As we began to emerge from the lockdown, a window was identified towards the end of July 2021. Indeed, the day after the investiture of our new PGM at the Grand Temple in Great Queen St, London, we held our AGM at the Novotel in Southampton.

During this meeting we decided to have a low key launch, and we were pleased to welcome the President of the MCF, Richard Hone, and the charity's Chief Executive Les Hutchinson. They gave an informative and illuminating presentation on the work of the MCF and the support it affords

to many worthy causes, not least the support made available to nearly 300 Freemasons and their families in our Province. Last year this Province received three quarters of a million pounds.

The hard work commenced immediately after the launch with the ambassadors crisscrossing the Province giving presentations and tutorials. To date they have made over 60 visits to lodges and other gatherings and I thank them for their unbridled enthusiasm.

Coupled with this, the Area Festival Chairmen have engaged with their lodges, offering guidance and support. We also have received tremendous encouragement and tangible backing from the MCF. Indeed, its Head of Fundraising Paul Crockett attended our Visiting Officers' Mess last October and gave us a very passionate and moving address citing several case histories of brethren and their families who have been assisted by the MCF.

Since the launch there has been a very good response right across the Province to get behind the Festival Appeal. I am delighted that there is now a greater awareness of what the MCF is and how it can help us all and also how it assists the wider national and international community.

I am delighted to say that so far there are 2,717 brethren who have contributed to the Festival Appeal, of whom 1,457 have qualified as Festival Stewards. Although this an excellent start there are still over 5,300 brethren yet to make any sort of contribution so there is much work to undertake. There is still a long way to go and I am sure that the brethren of Hampshire and Isle of Wight are well aware of their charitable responsibilities and will continue to support the Festival in the manner in which they have done so far.

I am also pleased to report that 20 Lodges have already qualified for the Bronze Award, 10 for Silver and three for Gold and I offer my thanks to these lodges for a wonderful effort and also their continued commitment to the MCF.





MAKING A DIFFERENCE -THE 2027 FESTIVAL GETS UNDERWAY

he last six year period of fundraising – known as a Festival – which ended in 2016, saw the Province raise a record £7.746m pounds. The 2027 Festival was launched this year and might even surpass the previous total if money raised so far is anything to go by.

Those members who sign up to a regular payment plan are entitled to wear a special jewel. To assist the brethren dig deep, the Province, through Deputy Provincial Grand Master Dave Perkis, introduced a specially produced Festival Ale that is stocked across many centres.

Members are able to raise a glass knowing that money from each sale goes to the Festival. Already £1,500 has been raised. Thirsty Freemasons

so far have drunk their way through nearly 2,000 bottles and a third batch of 960 bottles has arrived.

Festival Director Barrie Hewitt's roving Festival Ambassadors John Donoghue and Sean Whelan have noted great enthusiasm at the lodges where they have attended and given brief presentations. Their enthusiasm has resulted in hundreds of members signing up to regular payments plans.

Since the last Festival the number of ways donations can be made has grown, making it much easier. Members can donate by text, online,


He said: "I was out walking my dogs one day when I suddenly

became nearly blind – I had cataracts which came on really severely and pretty quickly. The MCF stepped in and helped me get my cataracts done in a matter of two months.

"If they hadn't I would have had to wait much longer and would have been totally blind."



David Dalton, a nurse and Master of Brockenhurst Lodge, explained how the MCF stepped in to help his wife.

He said: "My wife required a partial knee replacement and the waiting list

on the NHS was at least a year. By this stage she could barely walk. She was referred to have this done privately which the MCF funded. The MCF is a fantastic charity and I recommend everyone supports it."

Festival Director Barrie Hewitt said: "Already we are seeing members and lodges raise money for the Festival in numerous ways. We have a large Province and fundraising for this appeal brings us together in a common cause."

Someone who has gone that little bit further than most for the Festival is Caroline Whelan, whose husband Sean is one of the roving ambassadors. She leapt from an aeroplane at 15,000ft, spent a minute in freefall travelling at 125mph before her parachute opened at 6,000ft and brought her safely to earth.




As the Festival President, Jon Whitaker receives a cheque for £10,000 towards the 2027 Festival from members of the Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge.

She paid for the jump herself meaning all the money raised - £1,816.25 – went to the Festival. Caroline said afterwards: "I have achieved a lifelong ambition of jumping out of a plane. I've also had the chance to raise funds for the 2027 Festival which I know is a great cause."

Asked if she would do it again she immediately replied: "Yes of course I would."

clinical and holistic care that children and young adults with complex medical needs require.



THE PROVINCE OF HAMPSHIRE & ISLE OF WIGHT MASONIC CHARITABLE TRUST

The Province of Hampshire & Isle of Wight Masonic Charitable Trust (MCT) continues to provide immediate and invaluable financial and personal support to those Brethren and their dependents who have an urgent need due, in many cases to the present economic circumstances, the continuing effects of Covid-19 and family problems.

The Trust is proud of its reputation for being proactive and continues to succeed in achieving its aims and objectives by making sure that Members of Lodges in the Province are fully aware of how it can assist in times of need. The Trust's prime aim is to respond as quickly as possible to the request for assistance once the applicants' requirements are known and assessed.

The increased awareness of the Trust throughout the Province has led to many more of our Brethren seeking help and benefiting from the prompt response to their immediate needs.

The MCT provides a prompt response for one-off applications which are made on behalf of Brethren and their families to the Provincial Almoner from the Lodge and Area Almoners. During the past year grants have been awarded in excess of £60,000 to individuals and in addition financial support has been given to various initiatives such as the Mental Awareness Seminar and grants for Family Holidays.

Examples of Grants typically awarded are:

- · Financial support to overcome short-term financial difficulties including funeral expenses;
- Rapid response to the need for funding health related matters;
- · Support to fund events such as the Bournemouth Holiday
- Programme and sponsorship of Group activities.
- Emergency funding for items which otherwise might not be supported by the national Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF).

The Provincial MCT works closely with the Grand Lodge based Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) which is able to provide longer term financial, family and medical support. The MCF considers applications for grants independently but often recognises the urgency and support that is being provided by the Provincial MCT to individual cases.

The Trustees of the Provincial Masonic Charitable Trust are highly committed to respond to the needs of our Brethren and their dependents as a priority at all times.

THE HAMPSHIRE & ISLE OF WIGHT MASONIC GRAND CHARITY (THE TOM LANGTON FUND)

The Provincial Grand Charity was founded in 1985 by the then Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Col. Thomas Bennett Langton. Having completed its 36th Year the Charity has once again been able to give generous support to numerous charitable and deserving causes in the Province.

The Fund Committee has met twice during the past year, and approved donations to 24 non-Masonic charities, totalling £14,460. The Grants awarded varied in size from £250 to £1,000 and these were made to support a wide range of projects and causes. The total amount of grants awarded and donated since the Charity was established in 1985 stands at just under £850,000. As at 31st December 2021 the Fund's value of investments totalled £953,690, which had fallen to £937,339 by 31st March 2022 due to unrest in the markets..

Under the Chairmanship of W. Bro. Ron Griffiths, and despite the restrictions imposed by the pandemic, the Fund has had another successful year with many Lodges making applications to the Fund. The ideal beneficiaries are small self-help groups with limited resources, especially those whose activities involve children and less able-bodied people, where a grant from the Tom Langton Fund would make a significant difference to their work and success.

We especially thank our Trustees for their advice and support, and of course the Area Representatives for their considerable efforts in promoting the Fund and presenting the various applications to the Committee on behalf of Lodges in their designated Areas.

Finally, the Committee wishes to express its sincere thanks to the Provincial Grand Master, VW Bro. Jonathan Whitaker for his support, and to the Provincial Grand Secretary and his staff for their valuable assistance during the past year.

Treasurer's Report to the 31 March 2022

Cash position

The bank accounts as at 19 April were: Treasurer's Account £21,876
Current Account £17,073

Three cheques from the November issue, Walkerbot Appeal £1,000, Sport in the Community £250 and Royal Marine Voluntary Cadet Corps £500 had not been presented at this date.

No donations from lodges were received during the last period.

Portfolio valuation

As at the accounting date of 31 December 2021 the portfolio was valued at £953,690. The conflict in The Ukraine has produced unrest in the markets and at today's date the fund had fallen back to £937,339. We are still continuing to see a reduced return on the investment against earlier years.

Our stockbrokers have full control of our investments under the terms of business. They continue to monitor the markets closely to ensure that, subject to market conditions, they secure the best possible returns.

PROVINCIAL GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT

RW Provincial Grand Master and Brethren; I am pleased to submit the following report as Provincial Grand Secretary for the year ending July 2022.

2021/22 saw a gradual return to normality following the many lockdowns associated with the Coronavirus pandemic. Brethren across the province began to embrace the opportunity to attend Lodge meetings and there appears to have been a marked increase in visiting over the past few months, although some vulnerable brethren are still nervous about attending Lodge. Hopefully these brethren will begin to feel confident enough to resume their masonic activities in the coming weeks.

The year has been marked by a large number of Initiations which have taken place for those candidates who have been waiting to join the Craft; a total of 370 initiates have been registered since the date of last year's AGM.

Unfortunately, three Lodges decided to hand back their Warrants - Portsea Lodge 7794, Vespasian Lodge 4222 and William Fawcett 8612, with a number of others also in consideration.

Our new special interest lodge, Country Sports Lodge 9992 was consecrated on 4th February 2022 and the following Lodges celebrated notable anniversaries (some of which were postponed from the previous year due to the pandemic):

- Celebrating 250 years: Royal Gloucester Lodge 130 and Lodge of Hengist 195
- Celebrating 225 years: Lodge of Harmony 309.
- Celebrating 175 years: Zetland Lodge 515.
- Celebrating 150 Years: Saint Hubert Lodge 1373 and Aldershot Camp Lodge 1331

- Celebrating Centenaries: Elvetham Lodge 4013, Portsdown Lodge 4356, Southsea Lodge 4071, Norman Lodge 4124, Aldershot Royal Engineers Lodge 4178, Palma Virtuti Lodge 4187, Vespasian Lodge 4222 and Octa Lodge 4397
- Several other lodges are due to celebrate 75 and 50 years.

The Province was proud to show its support for brethren with a military background with the signing of our Armed Forces Covenant by the Provincial Grand Master and the Veterans Minister, Leo Docherty MP (on behalf of the MOD). The event was held at the Great Hall, Winchester, with a further celebration which took place at Cowes Masonic Centre for brethren on the Isle of Wight.

The development and roll-out of Project Hermes has again been delayed but will no doubt happen in 2023. The initial launch in the Province of Bristol appears to have been well received and I am sure that this initiative will eventually improve administration and be of benefit to both Lodge Secretaries and the Province.

2022 marked the passing to the Grand Lodge Above of our Assistant Provincial Grand Master,

W Bro Leon Whitfield PSGD. Leon had been a Freemason for 39 years and served his Mother Lodge, Area and the Province with distinction, I am sure he will be sadly missed.
